Key Knowledge

- The Tudor period was from 1485 to 1603.
- Clothes showed how wealthy people were.
- Houses were made using wooden beams and wattle and daub. Poor Tudor houses had a smoke hole in the roof. Rich houses were made from bricks.
- An Inventory was a list of what Tudor people left in their house when they died.
- Poor people in Tudor times (helpless, able-bodied, rogues) had difficult lives.
- Rich people in Tudor times enjoyed a variety of food, clothes, entertainment and past-times.
- The rich Tudors had plenty of everything whereas the poor Tudors had very little.

Timeline of the Tudors	
1485	Henry VII became King of England
1509	Henry VIII became King of England
1547	Edward VI became King of England
1553	Jane Grey became Queen of England
1553	Mary I became Queen of Scotland
1558	Elizabeth I became Queen of England

Key Vocabulary

Tudor – Period relating to the English royal dynasty which held the throne from the accession of Henry VII in 1485 until the death of Elizabeth I in 1603.

Monarch - A person who rules over a place, usually a king or queen.

Wattle and Daub - a material formerly or traditionally used in building walls, consisting of a network of interwoven sticks and twigs covered with mud or clay.

Deserving Poor - these were poor through no fault of their own and were therefore deserving of help.

Farthingale - A bell shaped hoop skirt worn under the skirts of rich women.

Workhouse -An institution where those unable to support themselves financially were offered accommodation and employment.

Court – The home of the king or queen.
